**Conventions** are sets of **rules** for what is normally found within a product

Comics use a set of **conventions** (usually)

Your work should usually keep to these conventions

Conventions and creativity in the components are **limited** in their fitness for purpose.

Conventions and creativity are applied in the final product in a **limited** way.

Conventions and creativity in the components are adequate in their fitness for purpose.

Conventions and creativity are adequately applied in the final product. Conventions and creativity in the components are **fully** fit for purpose.

Conventions and creativity are effectively applied in the final product.

Text is used in comics to help tell stories

In general, text is used in particular ways and has a set of normal styles

These are the conventions you need to keep to

in your work





#### Convention 1: typeface

Comics will almost always use a hand written style of **typeface** (font)

There are lots of choices of typeface, but this is a good chance to use comic sans - which was designed specifically for use in comics



#### **Convention 2: styles**

Most comics will use capital letters (**upper case**) for all text

There are some examples where **sentence case** is used, but the majority use capitals all the time

Bold text is used occasionally to add **emphasis** to key words

Text is almost always **black**

**Convention 2b: styles** 

Text is often **quite small** in comics

Exactly what size depends on the typeface being used, but between 6 and 8 points is normal

Larger text size can be used to indicate shouting or louder sounds






#### Convention 3: word balloons

Word balloons show speech and are one of the key ways that text is used in comics

They have a tail to indicate who is speaking

Text within word balloons is usually **centred** 

Balloons are often **white** with a **black border**. They are usually an **ellipse shape** 



#### Convention 3b: balloon types

Using a **dashed border** shows whispering. Text might also be smaller

A jagged border is a broadcast balloon and shows sound coming from a device like a phone or shouting

A **thought balloon** is cloud shaped with dots rather than a standard tail to show thinking





#### Convention 3c: balloon types

A jagged border can also represent a **burst balloon**. These are used for **emphasis** - perhaps when something is shouted. They often include **bold** or *italic* text or use a larger sized text

A double outline balloon is also used for emphasis at times




#### **Convention 4: narration**

Rectangular boxes are used to show **narration** 

This is where a character tells the story without using speech.

Narration is a key storytelling device in comics

Text is usually **left aligned**, but still in capitals. Narration boxes are often white, but may be a different colour such as yellow to set them apart from speech



#### **Convention 5: captions**

**Captions** can be used to set the scene or to explain what is going on

Captions are **information** rather than a character telling the story. They set the scene or describe action

Caption boxes are similar to narration boxes, but are often coloured differently to set them apart






#### **Convention 6: sound effects**

Text is used to show **sound effects** such as bang or splash

These are called **onomatopoeias**- the word sounds like the noise it
is describing

Onomatopoeias are usually drawn in a different style to the rest of the text in a comic, often with an explosive shape outline



#### Convention 7: titles

Comic books don't often have **titles** on the individual pages - that's what the cover is for

If titles are used, they are usually large writing at the top of the page. These might include chapter titles


#### Convention 8: other text

Text can be used in other ways for example, on signs, computer screens, letters or notes that characters are using or looking at

# Conventions of comics

#### Reading order

Don't forget the reading order is an important convention to do with page layout that helps make sense of text
