Comic Book Art in Photoshop

- 1. Open your image in Photoshop – File > Open
- Layer > Duplicate Layer > call the new layer <u>Lines</u> > OK 2. This creates a copy of the background layer so that we can work with it




Start with the edges

- 3. Make sure you're clicked on the **Lines layer**
- 4. Filter > Filter Gallery

7.

- Open the <u>Artistic section</u> > choose Poster 5. **Edges**
- Change the sliders on the right so they read 2 3 2
- Click **OK** at the **top right** This starts to add some of the classic elements you'd get in a comic book, including dark edges and merged colours


Turn it into a line drawing

- 8. Image > Adjustments > Threshold (about half way down the list)
- 9. **Reduce** the <u>Threshold value</u> to somewhere about **30** (aim for between 20 and 50) > click **OK** This turns the layer into a line drawing.

Smooth the lines

The lines are quite jaggy to start with.


- 10. Filter > Stylise > Oil Paint
- 11. Set the **Stylization slider** to **0** – as far left as you can
- 12. At the **bottom**, set the **Shine slider** to **0** > **OK**



Blend the layers

- 13. Make sure you're still on the **Lines layer**
- 14. Use the drop down box that says <u>Normal</u> above the Lines layer > change the setting to <u>Multiply</u>

This blends the layers together, keeping the dark lines and changing your image to be in full colour




Then deal with the colours

- 15. IMPORTANT: click back on the Background layer in the layer stack
- 16. Click Layer > Duplicate Layer > call the new layer Colours > OK
- 17. IMPORTANT: Make sure you're now clicked on the Colours layer
- 18. Click Filter > Filter Gallery > Poster Edges set the sliders to 0 0 2
- 19. Click Filter > Stylise > Oil Paint > OK

Adjust the vibrance

- 20. Layer > New Adjustment Layer > Vibrance > click OK when the pop up box appears
- 21. Increase the <u>Vibrance slider</u> (<u>NOT</u> the saturation). Try taking it most of the way over towards the right



Merge the layers

Once you think you're done, merge the layers to get everything on a single layer.

- 22. Layer > Merge Visible
- 23. **File > Save As >** save your work <u>WITH A NEW NAME</u>. This will save it as a Photoshop file (a PSD file type)

To use the file you'll need to **export it** as well:

- 24. File > Export > Export as
- 25. At the <u>top right</u> change the format drop down to JPG > click Export

Now you can add speech bubbles and other lettering to your image.
