
A **genre** is a style or category of something

The idea is useful a way of putting things like films, music, books and comics into groups

Comics of the same genre usually have similar things about how they look and are laid out

#### 1. Humour

These comics are funny. They can be long stories or just tell a joke. Some tell a joke every day





#### 2. Superhero/fantasy/action/mystery

These are one of the biggest classic genres. They usually tell the sort of a hero and their sidekick or a group of heroes

A good story is essential



#### 3. Crime/mystery

Some kind of mystery is solved – possibly by a detective

This genre is really wide reaching and can use all sorts of styles



#### 4. Horror/Noir

These feature ghosts, zombies and so on. They are dark and tell tense stories








#### 5. Romance


Love stories are a perfectly valid genre for comic book stories



#### 6. Non-fiction


Real life stories about real people or events. Comic books can be a way of encouraging people who don't usually read much to learn about these sorts of stories








#### 7. Educational

Rather than tell a story, comics can be used to inform or educate directly


