

Retro Comic Book Art in Photoshop

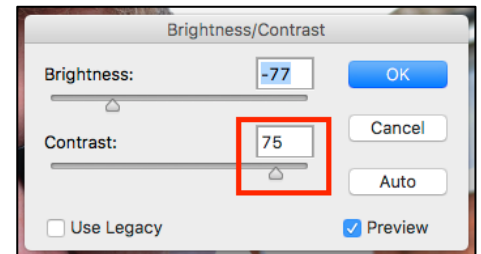
1. Open your image in Photoshop – **File > Open**

Adjust the Contrast

First we need to increase the contrast – the dark and the light needs to be stronger

2. **Image > Adjustments > Brightness/Contrast**
3. Slide the **Contrast slider** most of the way to the **right** (75 or more)

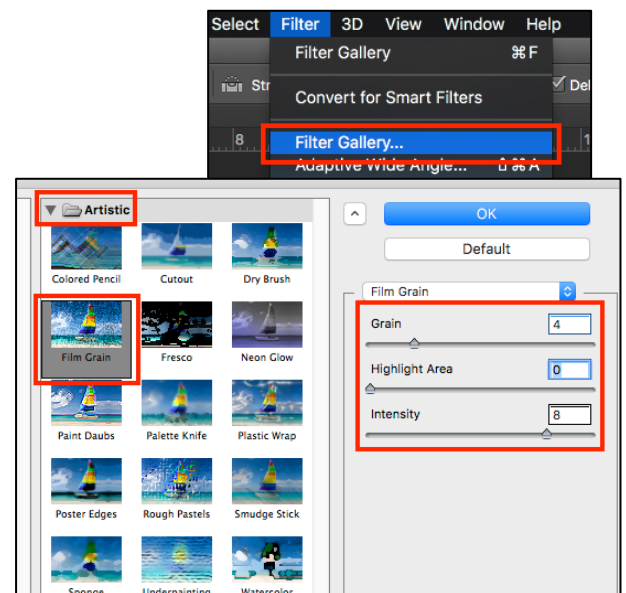
You might need to slide the Brightness slider to the left – but it depends on the image you're using. Aim for something with strong sections of dark and light



4. Click **OK**

Add Grain

5. **Filter > Filter Gallery**
6. Open the **Artistic section** > choose **Film Grain**
7. You probably want to have the sliders on the right set to **4 0 8** – but experiment
8. Click **OK**

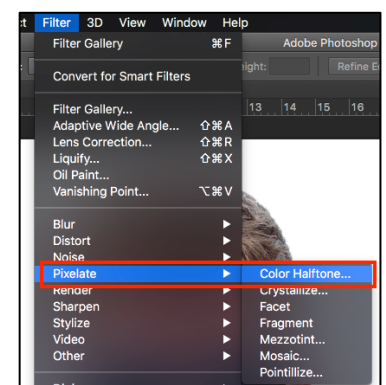


This adds some graininess to the image,

making it seem older. It's quite subtle, but it'll show up better after the next section...

Add Dots

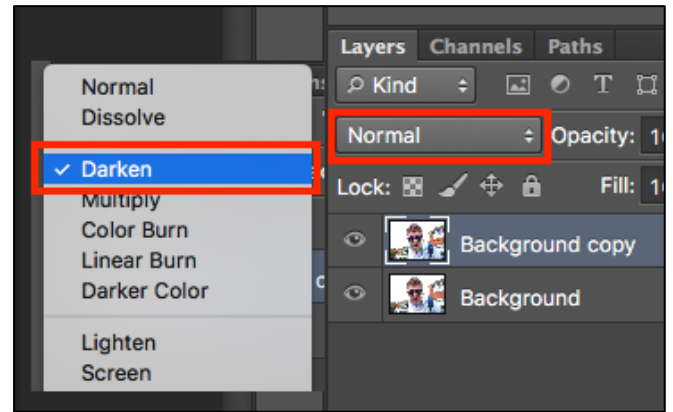
9. **Layer > Duplicate Layer > OK** (no need to name it)
10. **IMPORTANT:** make sure you're clicked on the new layer
11. **Filter > Pixelate > Colour halftone > OK**



Then blend the layers

12. Use the **drop down box** that says **Normal** above the Background copy layer > change the setting to **Darken**

This blends the layers together, adding strength to the dots you added

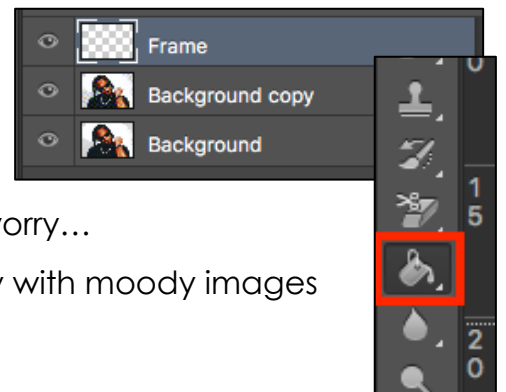


Add a frame

13. **Layer > New Layer >** call the layer **Frame**

14. Use the **Paint Bucket tool** (hidden under the Gradient tool) on the **left toolbar** to fill the Frame layer **white**. This will cover up your image – don't worry...

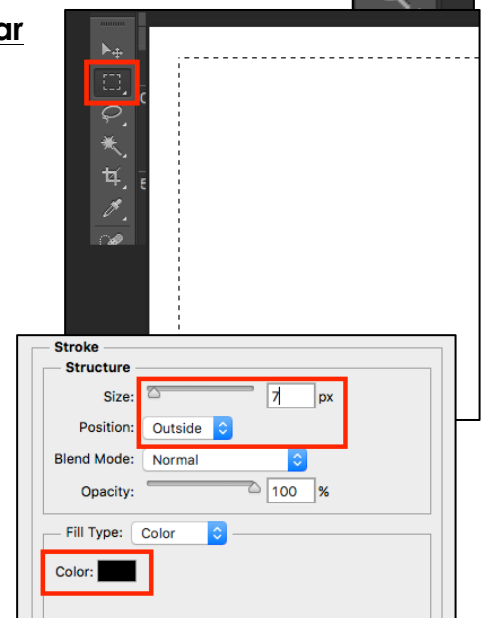
Filling the layer black can work as well – especially with moody images



15. Use the **Rectangular Marquee Tool** on the **left toolbar** (the dotted rectangle at the top) > draw a frame a little inside the edge of the white block

16. A dotted line will appear. Now press the **Delete key**. This should cut out the middle section of the white layer to create a white frame around your image

17. **Layer > Layer Style > Stroke >** set the Size to about **7** and the colour to **black > OK**



Merge the layers

Once you think you're done, merge the layers to get everything on a single layer.

18. **Layer > Merge Visible**

19. **File > Save As >** save your work **WITH A NEW NAME**

20. **File > Export > Export As >** choose **JPG** from the **top right**

Now you can add speech bubbles and other lettering to your image.
